Minnesota State High School League

The Office of the Legislative Auditor completed an evaluation of the Minnesota State High School League in April 2017. The full report can be accessed at www.auditor.leg.state.mn.us. As part of this work, we surveyed designated representatives of member schools for their perspectives on issues related to transfer student eligibility, League rulemaking, and League governance.

To survey our population, we obtained from the Minnesota State High School League the names and contact information of representatives to the League as reported by member schools. Most often, high school representatives to the League were activities administrators.

We used an online questionnaire as our survey method. To help develop the survey instrument, we requested and received feedback on a draft survey from several member school representatives.

In September 2016, we distributed our survey to member school representatives through email correspondence. We received a small number of return email notices with invalid or undeliverable addresses. We also sent two reminder notices to increase our survey response rate.

We received 340 responses from 479 member school representatives surveyed, for an overall response rate of 71 percent. Responses to individual questions and each question's response rate are reported in the attached document. For some questions, total percentages may not sum to 100 percent due to rounding.



Note: Survey respondents completed this survey online. For this document, the Office of the Legislative Auditor recreated the survey questions to post them and the results on the office's website. The appearance is different than the online survey, and some questions and instructions specific to the online medium are omitted. The question wording and general instructions are the same.
