## **ERRATA**

On average, chronic offenders had <u>1112</u> times more convictions for felony offenses, <u>44.5</u> times more convictions for gross misdemeanor offenses, and 4 times more convictions for misdemeanor offenses, than non-chronic offenders.

For example, they had <u>1142</u> times more homicide convictions, <u>1546</u> times more robbery convictions, 5 times more assault convictions, and 9 times more convictions for violating orders for protection.
