

ERRATA

On page 13, the last paragraph, line 3 should be revised as follows:

On average, chronic offenders had 11+2 times more convictions for felony offenses, 44.5 times more convictions for gross misdemeanor offenses, and 4 times more convictions for misdemeanor offenses, than non-chronic offenders.

On page 16, paragraph 2, line 4 should be revised as follows:

For example, they had 11+2 times more homicide convictions, 15+6 times more robbery convictions, 5 times more assault convictions, and 9 times more convictions for violating orders for protection.

On page 16, Table 1.7 should be revised as follows:
